We Are Family

Did you know that Foundry Church, Asbury UMC, and John Wesley AME Zion Church are siblings, brothers and sisters in the Methodist faith? We have shared roots, but for 200 years we have been separated by race. The Methodist church, like most mainstream denominations, played a role in perpetuating racism. Foundry has its part in that sad story.

We began together, twenty white and eighteen African-American members, free and slave.

But soon, Pastor Ginger recounted in July, as she welcomed John Wesley's Pastor Christopher Zacharias to our pulpit, Foundry members were segregated with black members required to sit in the balcony. Not surprisingly, black members sought autonomy and with Foundry assistance established Asbury in 1836. A dozen years later, a breach within Asbury over continuing white oversight led some members to leave and create what is now John Wesley AME Zion. Today all three congregations worship within a mile of one another.

Inspired by Foundry's Ralph Williams, lay members and clergy from the three congregations are now working to rebuild our family relationship. Last fall, we came together to study the mystic and theologian Howard Thurman. Led by Foundry's Deryl Davis, we learned about Dr. Thurman's spiritual formation and his theological gifts which deeply

influenced Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Our study was capped by a visit from Rev. Dr. Jesse Jackson who shared his personal recollections of Thurman.

Together, we continue to be inspired by Dr. Thurman's vision of a community of believers unified in faith, not divided by race.

I have been blessed to experience these joint congregational gatherings, making new friends at Asbury and John Wesley. More importantly, I've learned:

- We are family, inextricably linked by our heritage and our existence as children of God.
- Racial animus is insidious, ever-present, and must be continually addressed.
- We are all threatened by the inability of too many of our nation's leaders to call out and combat racism.
- When we really listen to one another and understand how seriously these divisions undermine our efforts to live as disciples of Christ, we are empowered to "stand up, speak up, and step out," just as Rev. Dr. Zacharias* challenged us to do.

Do watch for and engage in future activities sponsored by our three church communities. To start with, don't miss our pulpit exchange with Asbury on Sunday, September 8 and the first annual William Astor Kirk* lecture on October 17.

Foundry provides spiritual nurture, soul food to motivate and sustain you through worship, small groups, fellowship groups, classes and more. We also offer a variety of ways to engage in acts of social justice and sacred resistance. Here are some of them:

- volunteering for ongoing service and feeding ministries
- participating in fall and spring Great Days of Service
- · working for LGBTQ justice
- · practicing eco-justice

- advocating for racial justice
- pressing elected leaders to fund programs and policies to reduce homelessness
- partnering with Washington Interfaith Network (WIN) for affordable housing, jobs, and good wages
- doing whatever we can to help our immigrant neighbors.

In many cases, you may need only to make a phone call or show up. Next May, we need at least 250 Foundry folk to be present at a WIN action before the DC election on June 2. Plan now to show up!
