Christmas is about welcoming the light and joy of the world, so why do we sometimes feel so sad or just numb? The holidays can and do bring up memories and dreams -- perfect families, delicious meals, and just the right amount of snow. Those dreams, frequently disconnected from reality, have sometimes left me feeling dejected and not delighted.

Foundry's longest night service is a place to which we can bring all these feelings, memories, dreams, and realities. It's a moment when our fears, our grief and our anger mingle with our hopes, our persistence and our community. In this mingling we find our liberation in the trusting relationships we build when we share our deepest wounds and longings amidst the surrounding joy.

Working in advocacy and activist spaces lately, I find a wide and deep urgency for positive social change. People are yearning for it, praying for it, working for it. There are so many stories of pain, heartbreak, and infuriating complacency. Stories most often relegated to the margins of our society, with the forgotten, the cast aside.

And I have also experienced what it means to find light shining from these same stories. In these spaces, where we can see our inhumanity etched in tears, scars and death, I've witnessed incredible gifts. Without warning, there come moments when God's love and promise shine through those same tears and scars as relationships form and reconciliation emerges. A welcoming smile, a hug, a meal, can give just enough energy to find hope.

For me, the longest night service embodies this tension of working with both our best and worst selves, as the darkness of pain and injustice meets the light of simple kindness, as the dreams of holiday perfection meet our imperfection. At these moments when the darkness can feel and be crushing, I've seen how our eyes are drawn upward toward the light of distant stars. The tiny light of small almost unnoticed simple acts of love. Those tiny pinpricks of light, mapped out by our ancestors, tell stories of strength and resilience and community, leading us on until dawn comes again.
