I was feeling tender in ALL the ways we can.

Following the conference, bathed in deep relief and joy, I'm still feeling tender. Part of it is my awareness of countless moments of harm, of so many of God's beloved ones hurt and shamed, of those who didn't live to see this day or who left the church to save their lives. Another tender place is my gratitude for leaders who paved the way. In particular, I've been giving thanks for Phil Wogaman and Dean Snyder, my immediate predecessors who continued their strong advocacy, inspiring, encouraging, and praying for us this past ten years.

And then there's the tender place that emerges after something you've been working on a long time finally comes to fruition, when something shifts in a way you felt might never happen. What do you do in that space? It's a whole new world. It takes practice to breathe "this new air."

OUR CONTINUING JOURNEY TO RACIAL JUSTICE

The Power of Convergence

This is the third in a series of articles interpreting the values framing Foundry's work of becoming an inclusive community — **restorative**, **integrity**, **community**, **convergence**, **and expansive**. It follows Amelia's articles in the February and April issues of the **Forge**. Foundry is already doing some of this, but we can all be more thoughtful about how to be more inclusive in our lives and at church. Read on and learn!

As part of our work, the Interlocking Justice cohort studied the roles of bystanders, allies, accomplices, and co-conspirators. "Convergence" occurs when two or more groups unite to work toward a common interest. Learning about these roles helped me become more aware of how I have shown up with different individuals and groups and how I want to change.

Bystanders are spectators and do not get involved in a situation, which can discourage others from getting involved, creating a **bystander effect** — the more bystanders, the less likely any one of them will act.

Allies support, assist, and act on behalf of a group but do not become members. Accomplices assist with time and resources, joining a group, taking some risk. I see Foundry acting as an ally and accomplice through its Sacred Resistance work. For example, we ally with other churches through supporting WIN (Washington Interfaith Network) in its work on housing and healthy homes. We act as an accomplice with the Poor People's Campaign — a movement uniting communities, clergy, and other advocates to end poverty — taking risks in confronting elected officials and possibly being arrested. **Co-conspirators** plan or act together with a group, ignoring any risk of retribution. I think Foundry acted as a co-conspirator with the LGBTQ community on marriage equality within the Methodist church, risking both its standing in the denomination and defrocking of the Senior Pastor. This played a role in the recent decision at the UMC General Conference to remove this ban – an example of convergence.

In creating a more inclusive community, it is helpful to consider convergence and how we show up in these roles both as individuals and as a church.
