Life, Death and New Life

Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain, but if it dies it bears much fruit. John 12:24

As we move through Lent toward Easter, I am contemplating the dynamic cycle of birth, growth, decline, death, and rebirth. It's an archetype found in most spiritual traditions and a reality reflected in creation. In our Christian faith, Jesus doesn't just teach the paradox of losing life to find it but loses his own life to reveal the promise of life on the other side of death.

The cycle of birth, growth, decline, death, and rebirth is also present in communities. When John Wesley identified a need for spiritual renewal, he birthed a movement that mobilizes people to organize in small groups to connect with God and others in ever deeper ways. That movement grew to need a greater infrastructure to support its growth. Eventually the movement became an institution — The United Methodist Church.

All organisms — plant, animal, individual or communal — experience a life cycle. For a community to thrive over time, rebirth is required again and again. Contexts and cultures shift, creating the need to reclaim the zeal present at the birth of the movement. There will always be a need to identify changes required to stem decline and rebuild vitality.

Loss is often required for rebirth to occur. Part of what has been must be let go to make space for the new to emerge. You can't get to Easter without traveling through Good Friday.

Foundry is now developing a new vision to guide our shared life over the next several years. The United Methodist Church is in a time of great upheaval. The life cycles of our congregation and our denomination are at turning points.



I encourage you to learn about the issues facing the United Methodist General Conference in April and about Foundry's advocacy of equity and justice for LGBTQ+ siblings and all God's beloved children in and through the UMC. Opportunities to learn can be found on our Foundry website.

Continue to pray for Foundry and our emerging vision — that it will ignite hope and new energy for sharing the good news of God's liberating love and for building God's Kin-dom of peace with justice.

From the Pew to the Public Square

Did you know that Foundry is a key participant in the DC Poor People's Campaign? We – two Foundry members – are part of its Coordinating Committee. We marched with them in the MLK Holiday Parade honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. And this coming Saturday, March 2, we will join them to urge DC to act to end poverty in our city.

In 1968, Dr. King and others started the Poor People's Campaign, a broad movement uniting poor communities across the country. We work to strengthen and expand the movement Dr. King was leading when he was killed. We seek to create a powerful base of poor folks, clergy, and advocates, able to wield our collective weight to raise wages, end poverty and improve the lives of those abandoned in a nation of abundance.

More than one-third of eligible voters – 85 million – are poor or low-wealth citizens. Sixty million are already registered. Mobilized around an agenda, a fraction of them could determine the outcome of an election. The power is there, and this is the time to mobilize it.

We invite you to join us. We choose to practice our faith in the pew and in the public square, to offer thoughtful prayer and consoling words for the millions suffering from poverty. But it hardly stops there.

We join in solidarity to fight the injustices that conspire to allow poverty to persist. As an African American woman and a gay man — members of just two of many historically oppressed groups — we recognize the power of faith in the public arena not only to topple injustice but also to demonstrate God at work in our community and country.

We will follow where our faith leads us, from the comfort of our church, out to the city streets, and into the hallways of the powerful to advocate vigorously for actions that will lead to a better world for all.
