But soon I heard, during a livestreamed Sunday worship service, the first presentation by Foundry's virtual choir. Together with occasional Wednesday night Zoom hangouts and regular Sunday morning sing-alongs organized by Steve Pflasterer and Jubalate, virtual choir brings me together with my friends. We love our music and each other. Practicing in the Foundry choir room with Stanley and our crew gives me great joy. But I've discovered that singing in the virtual world gives me great joy, too.

Virtual choir is surely different, but now I know that "yes, it's the real thing, baby!"
